A Best Practice: Soul Friends

Many parishes – or adults on their own – have formed small groups: faithsharing groups, prayer groups, Scripture study groups, theological discussion groups, spiritual direction groups, etc. In this issue, we explore the journey and endeavors of one group from Our Lady of Fatima Parish (Schenectady, New York) and St. Helen's Church (Niskayuna, NY).

The Invitation

Helen Moon, the director of adult faith formation at the two parishes, sensing her own need and the needs of others within the parish, invited people through the parish bulletin:

Soul Friends:

Would you like to discover how God is present in your everyday life? Would you like to know yourself better? Would you like to grow in awareness of God's plans and dreams for you?

A small group of 'seekers' is forming who would meet perhaps once a month to grow and share the 'God-seed' that is in each of us. If you are interested, please come to a preliminary meeting on Monday, January 21, at 10 am in the library at Rosa Road church. If you cannot make this meeting, but are interested please call or email. Other times and days could be possible.

The Beginning

The group began with about twelve interested people; over the years it has dwindled. Helen mentions that the small size "allows for quiet prayer and sharing and deep friendship."

The invitation is always there for others to join or to begin a new group. Helen comments: "With the outline and the agenda so clearly spelled out, I am hoping that someone can 'join' us and feel at home quite readily." "Why do we need faith sharing groups?

Catholics, lost in the size of today's modern parishes, still look for more significant ways to share their spiritual life and hopes. Faith groups nourish this sense of belonging.

Our fast paced lives leave us little time to reflect on the meaning of life. Faith groups give you a chance to slow down, recall the day or week in quiet time and listen to yourself and others.

The Mission of Soul Friends

Soul Friends is a Spiritual Direction Group and a Theological Reflection Group:

A time to explore how God is present in our lives through prayer, faith-sharing, hopes and dream sharing . . . and daily living . . . An invitation into your center . . .

A journey with and into the Mystery of God

Guidelines for Soul Friends

We hope that this group will give each person who attends Mutual prayer support,

Opportunities to ask questions, share faith and/or uncertainties A chance to grow together in our understanding of our experience of God's presence

We pledge our support through friendship and prayer.

We promise to keep all that is said here confidential and non-judgmental.

We know that insights and comments are helpful at times,

but advice is usually not.

We hope that all feel comfortable to share and to listen with compassion and respect.

Everyone is encouraged to share, but no one is pressured to share. All are to be considerate of others by keeping their sharing to the allotted time.

Three other conditions are requested:

Pray for others in the group between sessions.

Be consistent in whatever practice seems best to reflect and honor your relationship with God at this time.

Before coming to the group, spend time in prayer reflecting on God's presence in your everyday life.

What This Group Is Not

This group is not a 'self-help' support group . . .

This group is not about psychological help or counseling . . .

We are not gathering together to 'solve' each other's problems or to offer advice.

We are here to pray, to share, to reflect theologically, spiritually -- *and* to listen . . .

In preparing for these sessions, Helen read a great deal about facilitating theological discussion or spiritual direction groups. It was often suggested that each person share followed by silence -- without any comments.

Helen goes on to say: "So this is what we first tried. Everyone was in agreement that they did not like this. They did not want 'advice' but they did want feedback, insights, comments; otherwise they felt disconnected. So we changed to having comments and sharing intermingled."

The Agenda for each Gathering of Soul Friends

When the group began, they used the book, *Inner Compass* by Margaret Silf (one chapter a month).

Opening Prayer

- "Come Holy Spirit"
- The song, "By Name I Have Called You"
- A few minutes of quiet stillness and prayer centering ourselves in God's presence, being open to that loving presence NOW.

Conversation

• Discussing and questioning what was read in Inner Compass or other spiritual reading that connects to the reflections. (15 minutes)

Faith-Sharing

• How has God been in my life this month? week? day? At times, this sharing is no more than a sentence or two. It is up to each person, remembering that sharing is a gift given to each other, and so is listening. (30 minutes)

Bringing Needs Before the Lord:

- Those who wish mention a need or desire to bring before the Lord.
- After each petition, the group prays silently for that petition for 15 seconds or so.

Our action plan for the month:

- What do I plan to do this month to grow spiritually?
- As each person ponders this question, all pray in silence for a few minutes.

Closing Prayer

- Prayer of Thomas Merton

Time of fellowship follows for any who wish to stay.

What Some of the Participants Have Said

- Sharing Faith in this type of atmosphere makes it more, more a part of my everyday life.
- I find myself so much more focused on God's presence throughout my entire day, not just when I am in this group.
- When I am experiencing challenges or problems, I know that these companions, these soul friends, are praying for me. It is so reassuring.
- In sharing with these people how God seems to be in my life, I have begun to notice even more God moments/experiences as each day goes on.

And so, through the interceding presence of the group, the dust is blown from our eyes. We see more clearly the presence of God in our lives."
